RESOURCES

As many of us know, the purpose of COLA is to protect the annual Social Security benefits from inflation. In the early morning of October 13th, 2020, the 2021 COLA Update was announced to be 1.3%. This comes at a decrease for 2020's 1.6% and is the lowest since 2017. This equivalates for the average retiree, to about \$20 more a month, to \$1,543 as opposed to the \$24 a month for 2020. In addition, the maximum amount of earnings subject to the Social Security tax will increase about 3.7% next year to \$142,800 from \$137,700. Advocacy groups for seniors consistently have called for larger COLAs, saying the consumer-price index, on which the adjustment is based, underestimates the rising costs facing seniors. The groups say recent COLAs have failed to offset rising prices for essentials like prescription drugs, food, housing, transportation and health care, including Medicare Part B premiums. <u>Health disparities</u> are preventable differences in the burden of disease, injury, violence, or in opportunities to achieve optimal health experienced by socially disadvantaged racial, ethnic, and other population groups, and communities. Disparity in access to healthcare services, under the mixed private and public US healthcare programs, elevates inequality of health and health status among Americans. This quarter, RetireSafe is taking an in-depth look into how health disparities affect seniors especially along the lines of access to healthcare and adequate healthcare coverage to meet their needs. The Annual Open Enrollment Period for <u>Medicare health or drug coverage</u> opened on October 15th. It will remain open until December 7th. If you want to join or alter a Medicare Advantage Plan or change to Original Medicare, now is the time to do so. ALL Medicare Part D (drug coverage) plans will change in 2021. These alterations may include a change in the monthly premium, deductible, list of drug coverage, and/or drug quantity limits, depending on your plan. South Carolina Voting Information

Early voting in South Carolina is available October 5th - November 2nd, but dates and hours may vary based on where you live. The deadline to request an absentee ballot is October 24th. Your absentee ballot must be returned by mail or in person by No-vember 3rd by 7:00 PM.

<u>Texas</u>

In Texas, Governor Greg Abbot's order to <u>limit drop-off ballot locations</u> to one per county has been upheld, meaning fewer places to deliver early-vote ballots will be available. With the size of the Texan counties, this means that several sites will be many miles away from active voters, and experts predict that some demographics, in particular senior citizens, will be disproportionately impacted due to a lack of reliable transportation available. If any of our members in Texas still wish to early vote, check with your local county where your drop-off location is, and if you may need to either mail-in your ballot or wait until November 3rd to cast your vote.
