Standing up for America's Seniors!

Dear Members of the House Republican Conference:

On behalf of my organization, RetireSafe, an advocacy group that fights on behalf of America's seniors, I am writing today to urge you to oppose any legislative proposals that would codify Most Favored Nation (MFN) policies. This is particularly pressing in light of the recent introduction of the Most Favored Patient Act of 2026 ([H.R.7837](#)), which would direct the Center for Medicare and Medicaid Innovation (CMMI) to test a model implementing MFN.

MFN would put senior patients at the back of the line by tying America's healthcare system to other countries that use discriminatory valuation metrics that deprioritize senior care. Foreign reference pricing proposals, like MFN, allow the government to artificially set prices based on other nations. These countries use metrics like the quality-adjusted life year (QALY) that, by definition, devalue care for older and disabled patients.

MFN ties American drugs to a socialist-style healthcare system abroad. Fixing U.S. drug prices based on states with a single-payer healthcare system embraces these anti-senior, anti-American values at home.

Basing our healthcare prices on failed foreign models will also ensure America's seniors experience the same results patients in other countries see—longer wait times and limited access. If healthcare providers cannot obtain treatments at or below the cost in other countries, they may be unable to offer them to patients. For seniors, who rely on multiple medications to live long, healthy lives, loss of access to even one drug can have a significant impact on health outcomes.

Beyond hindering access to existing drugs, MFN threatens the development of potentially life-changing future medications. The loss of a potential medication, which could be a new treatment for Alzheimer's or a cure for cancer, is devastating for seniors and their loved ones.

Codifying MFN through CMMI would impact the [millions](#) of America's seniors relying on Medicare Part B and Part D to get the medications they need to stay healthy as long as possible. Introducing foreign reference pricing into these programs will upend the current system, limit seniors' access to existing treatments, and halt the development of future cures.
